Blue Skies win FOUR Fresh Awards

Blue Skies picked up four gongs at the FreshAwards in London this month including a Lifetime Achievement Award for its Founder Anthony Pile and the overall Fresh Produce Business of the Year.

The Awards were organised by the Fresh Produce Consortium (FPC) and held at the Intercontinental Park Lane on Thursday 9 June 2016. The evening was hosted by actor and comedian Craig Charles and attended by over 500 people from across the fresh produce industry.

Blue Skies also won the CSR Excellence Award for the second year running and the Best Place to Work. Chairman and Founder Anthony Pile said "It is an absolute honour to be recognised in this extraordinary way. To receive a FreshAward means a huge amount to Blue Skies and is credit to each and every person who has played a part in our wonderful business, to receive four FreshAwards including a Lifetime Achievement Award and the Fresh Produce Business of the Year, leaves us all speechless!"
